SLC Teens, Center for Documentary Arts Partner to Create Exhibit

*--Photos and Oral Histories Will Celebrate the City's African-American Community
--Exhibit Part of Annual "Youth State of the City Address"*

SALT LAKE CITY, April 18, 2005—On Tuesday, April 19, YouthCity Government and the Center for Documentary Arts (CDA), a founding partner in The Leonardo at Library Square, will present an oral history exhibit to the Salt Lake City Council. The exhibit, titled, "Missing Stories," will be part of YouthCity Government's 2005 Youth State of the City Address.

The exhibit features individual and collective histories of African-Americans living in Utah from Missing Stores, An Oral History of Ethnic and Minority Groups in Utah by Leslie G. Kelen, executive director of the Center for Documentary Arts, and Eileen Hallet Stone. The project is sponsored by the Constitutional Rights Foundation's Robinson Mini-Grant Program.

Each spring, YouthCity Government, Salt Lake City's high school community and civic involvement program, presents a Youth State of the City Address to the Salt Lake City Council and mayor. In addition to the exhibit, this year's address, titled "Civil Rights," will also focus on YouthCity Government's 2004-2005 accomplishments, as well as goals for the upcoming year.

The exhibit is the result of a collaboration between the two groups. YouthCity Government students researched and selected visual and textual excerpts from Missing Stories with the help of CDA staff.
